Mapping the World

In the summer of 1778, a captain in the British Royal Navy **guided** his ship *Resolution* toward the coast of a large island. The captain's name was James Cook. As waves **rippled** against the ship, Cook saw that hundreds of islanders had gathered on the beach to greet the ship's **arrival**. They had **twisted** flowers together and wore beautiful chains of them around their necks. Others climbed **aboard** their long canoes and rowed toward Cook's ship in order to guide it into the **bay**.

A volcano had created the island, and lava rocks covered the beaches. It was one of a group of islands that makes up the state of Hawaii today. Hawaii was a beautiful place, but Cook and his crew soon weighed anchor and sailed off. He hadn't found what he was looking for.

One of James Cook's missions was to discover if certain places existed, so he always kept track of where his ship was in his record books. Cook made three voyages for the British Navy. On his first two trips, he explored the southern seas. Sailing far into these waters, he **spotted** a large mass of land. He explored its eastern coast for two thousand miles! This discovery added the entire continent of Australia to the world map. As Cook set sail from Australia, his ship was almost destroyed as it ran into the sharp coral reefs jutting into the water.

Cook's third **voyage** took him to islands in the South Pacific again, on to Hawaii, and then north toward Canada. This time he was searching for a waterway that people hoped would link the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. They called it the Northwest Passage, but Cook didn't find that. As usual, he kept track of the places he sailed; soon the coast of North America and the outline of Alaska became part of the growing map of the world.

As a teenager, Cook's ambition had been to go farther than anyone before him. Other explorers may have traveled farther, but Cook sailed to places where no one had been before. He even sailed closer to the South Pole than anyone had ever done. His voyages changed the map of the world!




